There seems to be zero follow up on issues by the administration. A major issue this year was swept under the rug and never dealt with. Zero. Follow. Through.

We've had problems with some mediocre teachers or teachers that are adjusting to pbe in sloppy or inconsistent ways. The worst example is probably little who grades slowly and inconsistently and refuses to provide rubrics. Pbe students need to understand there is an achievable path to a four for each grading term. It's evident as a systematic problem with only one student on high honor roll. I'm not looking for easier grading, just a clear and possible system. The Latin teacher is great, but the program is way behind grade level for other schools.

My child never has homework, not enough homework gets assigned.

I completely do NOT understand the report cards and grading system. My child and I both want the return of A-B-C grades!

I have much disdain for the proficiency based learning system (my son is a freshman at FHS)

Fewer tests, less homework.

I'm concerned about drubs in the school. My daughter is a freshman and she tells me the upper class students try to sell the freshman's cigarette and vape pens on the new walking path. This concerns me greatly.

Proficiency based education is a complete mistake that is both incomprehensible and serves to flatten achievement while baffling parents. It seems like an experiment being conducted on our children without our permission. An experiment undertaken to improve the results of marginal and unmotivated students at the expense of students committed to learning and education.. Our student doesn't understand it, the teachers cannot explain it and a third-party could not read a report card and gauge success/failure. I am resigned to the system hurting my kid. We'll have to make up for the damage being done at school at home. If I instituted such an unproven, confusing, excellence killing scheme at my company I would be justly ridiculed and most likely fired. You are doing the kids and the community a disservice. The kids know it. I think the teachers know it. The administration and board should know it. One student achieved academic High Honors in the Freshman class yet the list of those achieving "Honors" in both categories was huge. A flattening experiment hurting achievement and education and excellence. Stop it while you can.

9th grade PBE has been great in improving instruction

Better quality of materials when needed, improvement of teachers who are biding time until retirement who need to have an alternate job to better service kids, making sure that all staff who are engaged in children and experiential learning styles.

I've personally reached out to administrators that have never returned my phone calls on more than one occasion. I specifically reached out to an administrator due to the lack of respect shown to children and parents alike from one secretary. My question is how do we reach out children to be respectful when they are forced to interact with an authoritative adult who shows no kindness or respect to them?

At least my daughters are not ready to be completely on their own with homework assignments so teachers could encourage more time for kids to record assignments or the teachers should have their websites updated daily so kids can check online. My children often struggle with what is due and when because they didn't write it down and it is not online. Also, the homework load is waaaaay too much. They are not getting enough rest if they participate in sports or drama.

More foreign languages, not leaving kids behind school's sport

The investments we have made with the high school renovation and track and field have been a huge addition and there will be benefits that we don't even know about yet

First, the questions in this survey should separate administration from teachers. Teachers and administrators are not the same and have different impacts on the school environment. Top down reform does not work. The administration should have teacher input for any educational changes. These decisions should be collaborative. The teacher morale at FHS is low because of the administration's lack of respect for teachers.

I send my child to school for academics not to learn how to be a better friend. We provide a home where we teach morals, boundaries, ethics, this is not the high schools responsibility. The time spent making sure my child feels ok is a waste in my opinion, as academic time is lost.

My child is a high school senior. He is identified as GT. He has NEVER met with anyone since he started high school. The website used to say that the honors/AP classes were to meet the needs of the GT students. (It no longer does. It now is increasingly "hands off" for GT kids.) In my experience, there are limited class sizes and availability and my GT child is not given priority for honors/AP classes. I'm not saying he should be necessarily, but if that is how the school plans to meet his GT needs, he should be able to get in to the classes. In addition, I feel that there should be more direction and planning about course choices starting in 9th grade to optimize the available classes for those intending to go to college. There is misinformation or confusing information about pre-requisites, etc. For example, if your student wants to take calculus by their senior year, they need to double up on math one year. No one tells you this is an option or how to best go about it. I think that allowing the students to make class selection without more input from the schools or the parents sets them up to miss out of opportunities that would benefit them in their future.

I don't believe the administration and staff at Freeport High School truly encourage academic excellence. Too often, even in "honors" classes, teachers waste time - easily distracted to shift class time from teaching to personal matters ("the state of the state of

The gifted program in RSU5 is virtually non-existent. My child has been identified as gifted in math, but nothing -- NOTHING -- has happened. She has not received ANY additional, challenging course work.

When my child tries to use the literacy or math additional help, the teachers are often busy with many students, and he is not able to spend the time he needs with the teacher.

This school year there have been multiple challenges with teachers behavior as well as kids mis use of vaping etc. I appreciate the effort to stay on top of this and not to let either of these issues getting further out of hand.

The automated nature of administering student progress has either intentionally or inadvertently factored parents out of the dialogue between home and school. I get the distinct impression FHS has no interest in working with parents and devoted its time and resources to crunching numbers and not building strong relationships with students nor parents. Why there are not even enough slots for every parent to meet with teachers for conferences. I never get any feedback from , have never been contacted by or approached by my child's teachers. When I called the principal about a problem my child was having with a teacher, I was told that other students enjoyed his style and the follow up she would have with both the teacher and my child never happened.

The other area the school should focus on is the social life of students. There are very few school-sponsored social events. The few dances the school hosts feature grinding which makes my daughter and her friends uncomfortable to watch and prevents them from participating. They do not want to dance like that or have others "pressing against them." In light of the Me Too Movement I am disappointed the school condones a form of dancing that creates a social expectation that puts young women and men in uncomfortably close quarters with peers they may not know well or at all. It seems the school would rather create a sink or swim approach for its students in the social sphere than wade into a dialogue with faculty, parents and students to arrive at a solution that empowers students. The fact that grinding goes on at the dances when it must make faculty, parents and students uncomfortable speaks to the lack of leadership the school has at present.

We need more project based learning-less memorizing/rote

Better mentor ship programs and vetting mentors

Kids do not always tell their parents what is happening in school, would be nice to know as parents what is going on in the classroom and with our children.

Need to improve study hall: desks too small, lighting very bad, student's talking is disruptive, chairs are uncomfortable, attendance takes toooooo long (could student's sign in via a computer program or paper copy or check in - this is a problem because a student can lose study time and could not have the opportunity to go to the library. Promote and add more music, theater and choir programs - FHS emphasizes SPORTS way too much! For instance, the music program budget is so very tiny, relative to the very talented music teachers. Students need opportunities to move during the day, for instance, stretch periods, walking down the hall to take a break from a 80 minute class, (they do this at Mast Landing and it is very effective, students can go to stations throughout the building and do the designated stretch, we have these at my place of employment as well, humans need to move to be productive with their brains. TRUST the students more.

Stronger math curriculum and better hands on science curriculum. Learning from a textbook solely and regurgitating material is not creating an environment that promotes the love of learning.

Powerschool could use some attention. It seems only some teachers fill it out occasionally, and the user interface is horrible from a parental standpoint. We are not pleased about the new grading system. Unfortunately our child now believes a 2 and a 2.5 is average and acceptable. This is worrisome to us.

As always parent communication is important. Simply assuming that parents are checking power school is a faulty assumption.

In reference to sports. Student should be allowed to play/be involved in more then 1 sport during a given season, especially if the school does not offer that sport. Also, school should not allow coach to make student sign contract that they will only participate in that one sport. School is loosing some very talented individuals who would like to participate in a school sport and an outside sport activity.

Parents are invited to share, but their suggestions are not necessarily taken seriously. Coaching needs to improve- my son's coach know next to nothing about the sport he coaches, and he doesn't even promote team spirit or support individual athletes during meets.

The grading system in the 9th grade has lots of problems, from inconsistent rounding up and down of grades, to lack of clarity in what each grade means (different things to different teachers). Please listen to parents and give more gradation in grading and make sure there is consistency across departments and teachers. Thank you

I forgot to say when I completed the survey: Our son could use more guidance in regards to college application. There are few opportunities for him to meet the counselors and when he schedules a session he doesn't always know what questions to ask to make sure he's fully informed

Provide the traditional A-F, percentile-based grading system. Encourage/support teachers to develop creative, project-based, authentic and engaging teaching methodologies, rather than getting bogged down in this unnecessary, vague, counter-productive 1-4 rating. Keep class sizes small especially PreK-6 so teachers can effectively differentiate instruction. Embed feedback loops into the HS culture that puts administrators in touch with the genuine, day-to-day experiences and constructive ideas of students and teachers. Just asking for input is a not a dynamic process if stakeholders do not experience a resulting give and take change process. For the past several years, RSU5 has been too top-down ( current and previous superintendents in particular). Many teachers do not feel their voices are heard or that their buy-in matters... admin is not responsive. District keeps rolling over and getting distracted by government educational "initiatives" rather than tapping the insights available internally to create joyful, fulfilling learning and teaching environments. Not sure what "rigorous" means to the board, as used in this survey. School Board members should spend more time becoming familiar with all of the schools, getting to know teachers, understanding the actual impact of their decisions. I hope students and teachers will have an opportunity to complete a survey specific to their roles.

I feel that the plato program could be better supervised and the person in charge could keep up more with the students. Checking in with their progress and helping them set goals. And letting the parents know when their child is not making any progress or accomplishing anything.

Need to find a solution to the bathrooms being locked. It's not acceptable to have only one bathroom available for the entire student body. Especially in a school that is physically spread out. STOP BULLY'S

- \* Please stop the 1-4 grading experiment before it impacts our children's chances to get the widest possible range of college acceptances and the best possible merit aid packages from those schools. This applies to upperclassmen, who see 3s translated as 88s the lowest B grade at FHS. Standards-based learning is addressed through curriculum design -- It is not inherently connected to a 1-4 grading system.
- \* We think our student is in the GATE program, but honestly have no idea. We never heard much after middle school and figured that honors/AP was the FHS equivalent. Use a GPA for attaining honor roll status instead of a certain grade in each class.

Thank you for this opportunity. I do have a few issues about which I feeling passionate. My over-arching concern, of course, is school safety in the light of our country's 'AR 15 loving' culture, but I currently have no suggestions here at our district level except supporting a national teachers' strike. If you do participate in something --and I hope you do-- I will march with you. The following, though, is what I was stewing over before this Valentine's Day.

Honors courses could use more enriched content and academic rigor. My teen reports being disappointed at the lack of student participation in class discussions, under-whelmed with depth of instruction and assignments (Lisa Blier is a well-loved and respected exception) and feels generally under-challenged in non-science honors classes. And we don't understand why there is no honor level Western Civ class option when there are honor level classes in all other departments.

There are not enough time slots available for meeting with teachers at student conferences. By the time I get to scheduling conferences (even the day after scheduling is open), many teachers' time slots are completely full and I have to find time to schedule separately, which is not easy. This has happened to me every year.

Regarding student cell phone and lap top use at the high school: while I have not looked up the school's official policy on cell phone and the district-issued lap tops, it is shocking to me that whatever guidelines are on paper are not systematically enforced. Screen overuse in school is insidiously isolating, distracting and counter to academic learning and developing healthy social interaction. That any teen is able to text, play games during classes, or watch youtube, internet surf, etc, in lunch is not only unnecessary, it is bizarre and it contradicts the very goals of any decent learning institution. My teen reports that over 70% of students are on their phones during lunch and that relatively little actual social interaction occurs. Students secretly texting in class is distracting to the non-texting students as well. Please invest in locker boxes for cell phones and systematically enforce their use. Please strip down the laptop software and monitor more closely. If you adopt and enforce stricter policies in this area, I would happily become the personal champion of the PTSO or wherever I would be needed most! Teens need to be learning how to look peers and teachers in the face and shake hands, interact, discuss, debate and do that tough stuff. These 'soft skills' are getting increasingly harder to learn, and have always needed life-long practice and incessant honing. We are direly under-serving the future stewards of our society if one of the biggest influencers of our children --our learning institutions-- condone, promote or look the other way with blatant screen overuse. This is serious! We need to be pioneers in consciously teaching children how to use tech effectively and efficiently, not as a third appendage. Please enforce stricter policies here.

I strongly urge increasing PE requirements for non-athletes. Ideally, the options would be more in tune with activities that non-competitive or non-team sports types might enjoy if they were required to try like, yoga, pilates, dance, speed walking, martial arts, nordic skiing, snow shoeing --in addition to the excellent choices you offer already. Instead of one credit for four years, I suggest one or two credits each academic year. All teens need to learn to move their body in healthy ways; this supports all learning. If we don't make it required and consistent in school, many kids just won't try.

Continuing on the theme of supporting a holistic healthy learning environment, please give all high school students the opportunity to get outside DAILY during school hours. That wonderful courtyard, why is open so seldom? Again, I don't know the history here; I imagine students may have abused the space at some point, or there are too few hands available to monitor, but can't anything be done here? I just know my kid can't get out there and very much wants to. Sitting under a tree looking at a flowering bush for five minutes or even 45 seconds is arguably a much more helpful and true break than texting head-down in a corner. Please let teens sit somewhere outside during the school day.

The kids elsewhere who are coming to schools with their guns and their plans are talking to everyone, certainly. I am sure you all must think about this at least as much as I do. I know how hard, almost impossible your jobs are even without the dark overlay of the amazingly horrible reality of school shootings. My suggestions above seem soft and irrelevant in light this terror. Going forward chin-up though, I do think we serve all our children and our community best by continually re-creating a learning institution here in Freeport to become one which is more academically rigorous with all the tech bells and whistles, yes, AND also holds dear and teaches with heart-full commitment what makes us truly and wholly human.

You have a consistency problem.

Examples:

My daughter was told to wear her coat for the rest of the day because when she raised her hand to answer a question, her belly showed. Yet, I see young women walking around with the bottom of their butts hanging out of their shorts. This is not about the dress code, this is about consistent policy.

Teachers teaching the same class should use the same grading system. When one looking toward standards based grades with a 3 = 88 and the other grades on the 1-100 scale student's gpas are adversely affected.
